News from The Nursery & Early Years

HNEY Nutshell Week Ending Friday 19th May

Another busy week at the Nursery & Early Years has seen the second half of the Oak children enjoy their first Forest School session, all of the Oak children spending time up at the main site for their Creative Arts Morning and the Skylarks children taking a coach trip to the Brighton Sealife. One little boy from Oak returned from the Creative Arts Morning claiming it was 'fantastic'!

Fledglings 1 have been looking at shapes this week, making shapes with building blocks, stacking cups, experimenting with shape puzzles and creating shape pictures with collage. Outdoor time has been spent getting mucky with soil play and continuing to enjoy the astro grass.



The children of Robins have enjoyed a week of thinking about how to keep healthy with a role play Farmer's Shop giving them opportunities to put their ideas about healthy eating into practice.

Fledglings 2 have continued their Very Hungry Caterpillar theme and the display board is looking scrumptious with all of the food and fruit now adorning the walls. They have also enjoyed creating butterflies using stampers, painted their clay caterpillars and created caterpillars using circle patterns. The children have started to look at and begin to understand sequencing, using colours and shapes

Top Robins have been working on some super self-portraits. The mini beast theme has continued and they have enjoyed making ladybirds, bumble bees and frogs. They have also created some wonderful towers and structures using the construction blocks.

Bottom Robins have been focusing on Health & Safety this week. They have created teeth templates and been practicing cleaning their teeth; they have looked at the Robins Room Rules; they have talked about what they should and shouldn't eat to be healthy and have enjoyed a fruit and veg shop in the role play area. Outside, they have been washing the babies and their clothes and hanging the washing out to dry.

The highlight of the Skylarks week has to be the trip to the Brighton Sea-life Centre. The children saw a huge variety of fish and sea-life and were impeccably behaved as we toured the centre, touching sea anemones and star fish, walking through the Aquarium tunnel under a giant turtle, a number of sharks and some gigantic rays. Trying to keep all the children awake on the return journey was the biggest challenge of the day! In the Skylarks room, the children have been planting more seeds, including some herbs this week. They have been looking at food chains, what animals eat what food types and labelling animals. Outside in the garden, the much needed rain has resulted in some great mud pie making!

The highlight of Oak's week was the Creative Morning at the Hazelwood site and Forest Schools for some of the children. We were not as lucky with the weather for Forest Schools as the first group, but the mud added to the fun! The children also spent time in the amazing Tree House. They used their senses and explored the woods, sliding down a muddy bank was a very popular activity. Thank you Mr Walton for our adventure.

Open Morning at the Nursery was a busy morning with record numbers touring the site. Well done to all our staff and children for playing hosts to our VIP guests. Everyone was impressed with the opportunities available and with the engagement and happiness of the children.

Spotlight on English – Summer 2017

English in the Lower School – a creative approach which makes English a focus across the curriculum...


One of the great advantages of teaching our Lower School pupils in forms is that teachers are able to link English skills in to all aspects of the curriculum; even Maths questions require careful interpretation and understanding of key vocabulary. This cross-curricular approach means that English is the linchpin of effective understanding and expression of ideas across all subjects.

In Year 1, our pupils are off on African adventures, exploring rich and culturally diverse texts such as Handa's Surprise. Yet through their letter writing and story writing activities, the children are also practising the skills of effective sentence construction, varying sentence openers and starting to introduce adverbs into their work.



The children in Year 2 are working on matters much closer to home in their 'Up, Up and Away' topic which is based on homes and habitats. Through engaging and interactive texts like 'Meercat Mail', the pupils will practise both creative and practical forms of writing over the Summer term.

The set text covered by Year 3s in the Summer term is Enid Blyton's 'The Faraway Tree'. This magical story will help inspire our budding writers complete creative writing tasks, letters and leaflets as well as a recount of their trip to Blacklands Farm. They will also be developing skills on understanding clauses within sentence construction, word families, nouns and pronouns.



In Year 4, the Summer term will be spent delving into the adventures of Kensuke's Kingdom. This wonderful story by Michael Morpurgo will support the children in writing their own stories as well as practical writing tasks such as letter writing and instructions. The pupils will also be working on making their sentences more interesting by opening them with adverbial phrases and using more interesting conjunctions to extend their sentences.

The Year 5 pupils will be reading the morality tale 'Tuck Everlasting' by Natalie Babbit. Through this text, they will consider the question of everlasting youth while developing skills

is character analysis, summarising text, crafting rich descriptions of setting and developing balanced arguments. The scheme of work will culminate in a book review, which encourages them to reflect on the text and its themes.



Never a dull moment in the woods!

The summer term has been a hive of activity in the woods with Mr Walton leading Forest Skills for the children from Oak Reception (pictured above and below), Years 1 and 2. The children have been learning different skills to support and develop their classroom learning. Whilst the weather has not always been kind, the occasional spot of rain cannot dampen Hazelwood spirits especially when a waterproof and pair of wellies are close at hand!



2M – Focusing on collaboration and design skills.

The children were making bug hotels focusing on ensuring their hotel was sturdy and well built. The children evaluated and rebuilt their dens to develop and improve their initial ideas.

1A – Focusing on teamwork and GRIT

Building towers in pairs the children evaluated and built together. They worked out the biggest sticks needed to go at the bottom and shorter, straight sticks at the top. We are looking forward to using our skills to build a fire next session.


The children in Fledglings have been fine tuning their group skills, learning how to take turns and work together. They have also been creating butterflies using finger prints.

Hitting the high notes

On Saturday May 13th the Junior, Training and Chapel Choirs enjoyed a fabulous masterclass with Dr Amy Bebbington.

Dr Bebbington is part of the Choral Conducting tutor team for the Association of British Choral Directors, leading courses for young people and adults across the country. She recently spent five years as Choral Director for the Royal College of Music Junior Department Choirs and is a musicianship tutor for the National Youth Choirs of Great Britain. Dr Bebbington worked on BBC2's **The Choir: Sing While You Work** and runs choral direction training days for the Military Wives' Choirs' Foundation.

As a teacher trainer/animateur, she has worked for Trinity/Open University, Glyndebourne Education Outreach, Sing for Pleasure, Music of Life and Youth Music. Dr Bebbington has had choral works published by Shawnee Press (USA) and Banks Music Publications (UK), which have been performed by award-winning choirs on international stages. She was recently invited to adjudicate for Choir of the Year, alongside Mary King, and at the Cheltenham Music Festival (amongst others).

Our choral participating children were treated to some wonderful 'warm ups' and then Dr Bebbington supported our children with diction, engagement with the text, and performance techniques. Children and staff alike had a terrific day and we all learnt a great deal.


