

As a school we are not able to make day to day decisions about what you and your children choose to access outside of school. I would, however, strongly suggest you look at the content in apps, games and films before allowing children to look at content out of their age

range. I would further suggest that as well as regularly checking children's devices that you should consider which social media apps the children can use responsibly, certainly for all the children at Hazelwood I would argue that Snapchat isn't appropriate with the disappearing images making it difficult for parents to track their children's online activities and raising questions about what images they want to share which need to disappear so quickly.

Last week you should have received a 'Digital Parenting' guide from Vodafone which has some excellent advice and I would recommend you read especially page 5 about PANTS and page 6 on Social Media.

### English in the Upper School – the magic of the Summer term...

As Quidditch Club soars in popularity, ‘magic’ seems to be the word on everybody’s lips. The English department is no exception. As the mischievous fairy Puck in ‘A Midsummer Night’s Dream’ amuses our Year 6 pupils and the menacing witches in ‘Macbeth’ haunt our Year 7 pupils, there seems to be no escape from the magical and supernatural themes of William Shakespeare’s plays. Even in their preparations for Common Entrance exams, Year 8 pupils in Mrs MacDougall’s set have been practising their creative writing skills in producing rich and original descriptions of magical settings.

The study of Shakespeare’s plays in the Summer term is one of the highlights of our year. It is an absolute joy to bring these rich, challenging and timeless texts to life for a new generation to enjoy and appreciate.



As part of their studies, Year 6 pupils have produced a magazine article intended for children of their own age, outlining background information to the life and times of William Shakespeare. Over the rest of this term, as ‘A Midsummer Night’s Dream’ unfolds, we will write persuasive letters, informative leaflets, diary entries, essays and write our own play scripts. With improving weather, and to balance the rigours of spelling, punctuation and grammar exercises, we hope to act out sections of the play outside and enjoy the great outdoors.

Year 7s have also explored the historical context of Shakespeare’s plays and ‘Macbeth’ in particular. Already, we have written informative magazine articles and letters of advice relating to the play. Later in the term, we will write essays, diary entries, newspaper reports

and film reviews. Again, we hope to make the most of summer weather after the exams and use our extensive grounds as the backdrop for acting out sections of the play.

There is no escaping the fact that Year 8s have a tough few weeks of revision in the run up to Common Entrance exams. Their diligence and determination is an inspiration to us all and we look forward to the pleasures of an alternative programme of work and activities after the exams.




**Hazelwood Continues to Inspire Luke's Squash and Vice Versa**

It's been over a year since Nutshell reported how Roald Dahl's Matilda inspired Luke McBride – then in 1A, now in 2T - to qualify for the Surrey Squash U11 Development Squad. Luke was also inspired by last term's TED project. Whilst researching GRIT, Luke played several matches against older and taller opponents in which he lost the first two games. Luke explained what happened, "I thought about how GRIT enabled Gabby Douglas, the American Gymnast, to win two Gold medals at the 2012 Olympic Games. Like Gabby Douglas, I never gave up. I was determined to play my best. I chased down every ball and fought back to win all these matches, 3-2. Since then, I have practiced my lobs, which have to be very good to float out of the reach of much taller players and drop into the back corners."

Luke plays for the Limpsfield Club U11 squash team and was one of two squash juniors to receive a bursary for his dedication, improvement and sportsmanship. Despite being the third youngest junior squash player at the Limpsfield Club, Luke has climbed the Junior Squash Ladder and is placed 34th out of 62 players. Luke is featured on the Limpsfield Club's face book page, practicing his forehands and backhands. As well as training with the Surrey U11 development squad, he plays in box 7 of 15 boxes in the West Kent Junior Squash league.

Luke would love the Hazelwood sports curriculum to include squash. He said, "I could then represent Hazelwood and help the team to beat other schools and win inter-school trophies." Luke's parents commented that, "Hazelwood and squash are a good fit: Hazelwood's values have improved Luke's attitude to squash and squash has improved Luke's listening, concentration and other skills, which have supported his development at Hazelwood."



### Who is the smartest giant?



### Little Women by Louisa May Alcott: A Book Review by Lucy H (Year 6)

Little Women is part of a series of books which charts the adventures of the four March sisters. Set in the 1800s in a small New England town, this one focuses on one year in the lives of Meg, Jo, Amy and Beth. They are a poor but loving family and with their father away at war it is left to their mother, 'Marmee', to encourage them to be the best they can be. Each

of the girls has to strive to overcome her weaknesses and to learn lessons about herself, friendship and family.



Although it isn't packed with action, it is very entertaining as you learn more about the characters through their different antics. The girls are touched by hardship but there are equally humorous moments which make you smile. The characters are intricately described throughout the book with the result that you grow to care about them. Jo is my favourite character. She is a tom boy - whom her father refers to as his 'son Jo'. She is strong and wilful and has to work at subduing her personality. She is like me in that she loves reading and writing and composes plays for her sisters to perform and writes short stories. She doesn't want to be a conventional woman and dreams of becoming a writer.

It is a purely moral story which seeks to teach lessons about standards of behaviour, fairness and honesty without preaching to the reader. Although it is set in a different era there are still things which are relevant to

today. It highlights the importance of family before all else but also the significance of cherishing friendship.

This has become one of my favourite books. I loved the story of the girls but on another level I can appreciate the skill in the way the book is written, the use of language and the advice given. It offers a refreshing alternative to some of the modern stories of Jacqueline Wilson and Cathy Cassidy, which can be depressing. It now takes pride of place on my bookshelf - next to Alice through the Looking Glass



24. Three congruent squares overlap as shown. The areas of the three overlapping sections are  $2 \text{ cm}^2$ ,  $5 \text{ cm}^2$  and  $8 \text{ cm}^2$  respectively. The total area of the non-overlapping parts of the squares is  $117 \text{ cm}^2$ . What is the side-length of each square?

A 6 cm    B 7 cm    C 8 cm    D 9 cm    E 10 cm



24. **B** Each of the overlapping areas contributes to the area of exactly two squares. So the total area of the three squares is equal to the area of the non-overlapping parts of the squares plus twice the total of the three overlapping areas i.e.  $(117 + 2(2 + 5 + 8)) \text{ cm}^2 = (117 + 30) \text{ cm}^2 = 147 \text{ cm}^2$ . So the area of each square is  $(147 \div 3) \text{ cm}^2 = 49 \text{ cm}^2$ . Therefore the length of the side of each square is 7 cm.
