


Hazelwood School

It has been a year in which we explored Angela Duckworth's research on GRIT. Angela Lee Duckworth is a psychologist who has dedicated her research to finding out what personality characteristics are associated with success. She has found that across very different contexts, the one characteristic that is a significant predictor of personal success is not social intelligence, not good looks, not physical health nor IQ it is grit.

Consider this: the most successful people in life are gritty in whatever they have chosen to do. Albert Einstein once said "It's not that I'm so smart, it's just that I stay with problems longer".

GRIT should not be seen as necessarily just an approach to everyday life. It is not. There is far more to it. It is about a culture of developing self-worth within the person, which enables the individual to develop and build inner strength. We have a unique opportunity to build these skills.

At the opening of the Baily Building the choir sang "it takes a whole village to raise one child". This song was deliberately chosen as a statement from us as a school to state our intention to continue to work together to build a culture of self-worth for our pupils to which all could subscribe and all could belong.

The culture in which we live and with which we identify shapes just about every aspect of our being.

One could compare the daily buzz of prep school life to living in a village, it could indeed be seen as a world in its own right. It has its own pulse and soul where our pupils are the driving force. They run their lives, experiment, and trial. They have their teams- Baily, Parry, Irving and Dowling. Within these we compete, we make friends and we take care of one another. We work to deadlines, be it tests, TED projects, concerts, shows, sporting events or simply getting to and from lessons or school on time!

Our parents get involved, our grandparents get involved. We do fundraising and help others through the Hazelwood Community Fund. We learn how to react under pressure, what our strengths are and what we need to do to support our weaknesses. Our students get to truly know and develop their personalities.

And us as adults, we are carefully creating support networks, opportunities and challenges. We are, together with our pupils, creating a culture and a backbone for them, which will help shape their futures.

I am excited by what lies ahead for the community of Hazelwood School, and thankful for the year which has past in equal measure. I hope that you all enjoy a wonderful holiday and that whatever September may hold, continuing or new adventures, that you will be ready to seize hold of them with passion, anticipation, determination and grit.

News from Hazelwood

Gold and silver at the National IAPS Athletics Finals

A very cheerful and excited squad of athletes made the long trip to Birmingham on Monday for the National IAPS Athletics finals. After a lovely dinner, the pupils went to bed early to get some much-needed rest ahead of the events the following day.

Our 1500m runners Luke D, Hannah R and Oscar P were up first. They all ran extremely well against some exceptionally strong opposition. Fantastic times were recorded by all and valuable experience gained. Over at the High Jump Jas F was starting her pursuit of National glory. She came into the competition as one of the favourites and it was soon clear to see why. She breezed through the heights with one minor blip at 1.30m. Having cleared 1.35m Jas was assured of at least silver as there was only one other girl left in the competition. Both girls failed at the next height and shared the gold medal and the right to call themselves National Champion. A fantastic achievement and a first for Hazelwood Athletics. Jas's success filled the squad with confidence.



Oscar A-L and Thomas H ran well in the hurdles and 200m respectively. Both narrowly missing out on a place in the finals. A slightly stronger finish from Oscar and he could have made it through. Jas was also back in action on the track. She ran a new PB and broke the school record in a time of 28.78 sec to qualify for the 200m final later in the afternoon. Over at the Shot Putt Lucy L was also in search of a medal. Her technique was floorless and she came away with a well-deserved silver medal, missing out on Gold by a mere 10cm. Another fantastic achievement and another first for Hazelwood.

Team Hazelwood were by this time tired and weary but every ounce of energy was mustered together to support Jas in her 200m final. She ran another outstanding race finished in 3rd place but only a matter of milliseconds behind first and second. To put into context how strong a field Jas was up against, the girl who won the race broke the existing 18 year old national record with a time of 28.08. A delighted but exhausted Jas collected her bronze medal to wear alongside her gold from earlier in the day.

Hazelwood have broken new ground this year in Athletics and we now start to plan ahead to next year when we hope to bring news of more success from our extremely talented pupils.
