

# The Nutshell



Hazelwood School

“At the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918 the guns fell silent on the Western Front, to bring to an end the First World War. We have recalled that moment through our Armistice and Remembrance events over the decades; decades during which the men and women of our armed services have continued to pay the ultimate sacrifice. And so 98 years later, we stand here today to remember lives sacrificed in the service of their Country, and those traumatised and injured in conflict. May we continue to honour justice and freedom that the bravery of all who fought, and still fight, may be remembered in a world of peace”. Thank you to the whole school community for a moving and respectful service this morning.



On Monday evening the school were delighted to give £8,200 away in its first distribution of the monies raised by The Community Fund. The Fund was set up during our 125 Anniversary celebrations as a way of saying ‘Thank you’ to the residents of Oxted and other neighbouring villages for hosting the school on Wolfs Hill for all that time. The Fund benefits from school and HPA fund-raising and from private donations. Invitations to apply for grants up to £750 were issued through internal communication, press and social media. We were pleased with the response that we got; a great variety of organisations and activities across a range of ages. The Community Fund Committee, comprised of school staff, a school Governor, a school parent, a long-standing member of the local community and the editor of the County Border News, met to share their equally wide ranging views and opinions.

With so many good submissions, the Committee were unable to support everyone and the hardest part of their role was to choose those which stood out from the rest knowing that they were bringing delight and disappointment in equal measure. More detail will follow but in short, The Community Fund, with your help, support and assistance, was delighted to be able to help, Busy Bees pre-school (Hurst Green), Tandridge Village pre-school, Piranhas Swimming Club (Edenbridge), Bloomin’ Arts (Lingfield), Oxted Young Persons’ Theatre, Oxted Scout Group, Unique (a charity dedicated to researching and understanding chromosome disorders), St Peter’s Church, Home Start, East Park Riding for the Disabled, Oxted Cricket Club and North Downs Community Orchestra. More details will follow in subsequent issues of The Nutshell with pictures showing the organisations’ members enjoying, and learning from, the fruits of all your labours. It is hoped that The Community Fund’s coffers will continue to swell so that we can invite local and community organisations to apply annually for grants of a similar size and diversity. It is hugely important for the

School that we take our place in the community and that our pupils are aware of, and involved in if at all possible, the excellent endeavours which make Oxted and its surrounding villages such a rewarding and engaging place to live. A special thank you to the HPA without whose fundraising verve and energy, The Community Fund would not have been able to help quite so many to the financial extent that we have.

“I was very happy to hear this morning, that Hazelwood School has approved our application for a grant towards one of our new practical information guides.

### **News from The Early Years**

This week the Early Years have been thinking about Nursery Rhymes and we have had a wide variety testing even my memory to try and find new ones. It was lovely to see all of Oak and many of the younger children dressing up on Thursday as their favourite Nursery Rhyme character. Thank you to all the parents for taking the time to create costumes for the children. They were all very proud of them. I was very impressed that they could all tell me who they were dressed as and recite the rhyme. In music this week we also explored different nursery rhymes with instruments as well as beginning our songs for our Nativity plays and Christmas concerts. Not long now!

Fledglings 1 have been discovering new mark making skills this week and have also created some impressive fireworks pictures. The children have enjoyed playing with different hats and using the percussion instruments to accompany different nursery rhymes.

Fledglings 2 have done lots of handprint painting this week. They have created handprint spiders for Incy Wincy as well as making a start on Christmas trees and calendars. They have also looked at toys relating to nursery rhymes in particular the Wheels on the Bus and Polly Put the Kettle On.

Upper Robins have spent lots of time exploring play dough. Each day they have had different coloured and even different scented dough! They have investigated using different hand movements and begun to use simple tools. They too have enjoyed many different nursery rhymes, but chose to focus on Incy Wincy Spider and have had fun creating spiders and their webs.



Lower Robins have explored potion making and spent lots of time cutting a variety of different shapes and materials. They have also enjoyed learning about the importance of poppies as we approach Remembrance Day. As a group they created a large handprint poppy and each child also created their own individual poppy using finger painting.

Like all other rooms on the Early Years site, the children of Skylarks have been immersed in the world of nursery rhymes. The children have enjoyed building Humpty Dumpty's wall and creating pictures of their favourite nursery rhymes. When looking at the nursery rhyme Doctor Foster the children drew around themselves and measured up to their middle. The children have all grown in confidence and have enjoyed performing their favourite rhymes.



The Oak children have been very busy doing crafts, writing, Maths and reading all based around our favourite Nursery Rhymes. They have learned about rain with Doctor Foster, created woolly sheep and hoped Mary wouldn't lose any. They also thoroughly enjoyed making playdough birds to sing the 2 Little Dickie Birds rhyme. On Thursday the children all dressed up as their favourite nursery rhyme character and the whole year group came alive with a wealth of different characters.



Using very effective, and simple, stark red hand prints, the children of lower Robins created a stunning and poignant Remembrance Day display.

All of the children are excited about starting our Christmas songs in preparation for the end of term. The Robins children who attend music will put on a concert for their parents with songs and percussion instruments. Those who don't attend music are welcome to come along to the concert with their parents. All the Skylarks children will be performing 'Shine Star Shine' and you will be receiving a letter this week as to what part your child will be playing. Oak will be performing 'Whoops A Daisy Angel' and again letters regarding tickets and costumes should have come home this week. I look forward to welcoming you all to the different performances.

### News from Hazelwood

#### Year 5 immerses themselves in Water

Last week as an introduction to their topic on “Water” Year 5 were treated to a week of water related talks and activities. Educational experts from East Surrey and Sutton water came and shared their knowledge and experience about all aspects of water including how important clean water is for health, how water is treated before it is safe for us to drink, what it is like to live without safe water in different areas of the world and how we can save water. We were then lucky enough to visit Bough Beech Reservoir (which is not open to the public) to see all the stages that water goes through before it is clean enough for us to drink. We walked through a tunnel that was 23 metres below the reservoir itself, saw the sludge that is removed from the water as part of the cleaning process and at the end of the day sampled the product itself. It tasted beautifully clean and fresh. We all agreed that we are so lucky to have such refreshing water coming through our own taps at home.
