Never was there a more eclectically dressed cast on the Hazelwood Theatre stage. But it worked. And it rocked! A fabulous performance with a versatile cast adapting to playing, in some cases, up to three parts each. There was topical humour, audience participation, moments of calmer reflection and, of course, the inevitable battle scene giving, in this case, the Elflings the chance to win one over the Orcs. It is still a mystery where Znacbar, the villainous leader of the Orcs disappeared to as she evaded capture. Do please keep an eye out for her as you make your way around the site. Approach at your peril and do not be fooled by her silky vocal chords. She may sing like an angel but she is the devil in disguise!



Congratulations go to everyone associated with the Year 6 play. It was a theatrical triumph across the board and goes to show what hard work can achieve. Even the Beast from the East was unable to dilute the zeal with which the onstage and backstage crews overcame missed rehearsal time. Staging the Richmond Park Warriors with a cast of sixty children may have turned Mrs Housego a lighter shade of grey but it delivered, for the audiences who enjoyed it, two evenings of technicolour fantasy!

Equally glorious in their colour and diversity were the TED projects created over the Christmas period. I have visited many of the classrooms and been astounded by the ways in which the children have taken the It's a Wrap theme and explored it in so many wonderful ways. From the youngest to the oldest, the breadth and quality of approach has been both astounding and inspiring. I have learnt things I never knew. I have seen progress made by so many as I look through the course of their consecutive TEDs. And I have been bowled over by the excitement of the children, keen, and proud to show off their work. I hope that the TED planned for the Easter break will be received well and that through the excitement of the Royal Wedding, Springwatch and the FA Cup Final, levels of creativity will take off to an equally high stratosphere!

I am delighted to be amongst a group of Hazelwood teachers heading off to Tanzania over the Easter holidays. We are returning to the four schools in the Songwe District to further develop our relationship with the staff and pupils out in Africa. I am hugely looking forward to what I know will be a life changing experience. I am as keen for us to help change their



lives as I am for what we learn out there to affect our perspectives back here in the UK. I am grateful to the parents from the various music groups involved who have accepted the invitation to attend our Charity Concert on Sunday 25th March. As well as hearing more about the project and enjoying some of the music that the choirs and ensemble groups have been working on this term, our audience will get the chance to support the project through making pledges.

We are hoping, through your generosity, to fund some of the resource that we are looking to take out, in the very first instance, to share with the Songwe community. News from The Nursery & Early Years

After the buzz of Science week, the children have maintained their momentum in wanting to learn new and exciting facts and skills. This week saw the first of the reception class assemblies. Mrs Taylor's class performed their class assembly on Wednesday. This included dressing up as what they wanted to be when they grow up, and telling the story of "The Enormous Watermelon", working as a team to pull it up, they delivered the message about the importance of collaboration brilliantly! They all spoke with confidence and enjoyed another opportunity to perform in front of an audience. Miss Sanger and Mrs Smith Chandler's class are now looking forward to their performances over the coming weeks.

Fledglings 1 this week have continued carrying out scientific experiments as they had so much fun last week. This week we have been making bigger volcanos and adding different colours. We have also been tasting grapefruit and making magic milk.



It has been a week of arts and crafts in Fledglings 2. The children have enjoyed exploring colour and have to name a few things been bubble painting, painting pictures of the sun and rainbows, making rainbow necklaces using beads and pipe cleaners, this not only helped with colour recognition but showed what fantastic fine motor skills the children have. The children have been particularly interested in the weather this week as well, talking about the sunshine and the clouds.

Lower Robins have enjoyed exploring the book 'The Selfish crocodile' and other books that focus on jungle wildlife. The children have loved playing with, and creating their own small world jungle scenes (they particularly enjoyed pretending to be tigers), painting jungle animals, counting crocodile teeth as part of their mathematical development and *making a largescale crocodile*.

We have transferred some frogs spawn into a tank so we can observe their development at close range. We are taking small groups of children to visit Peanut in the library to promote understanding of interacting with dogs. Some of the children have been very creative and have designed their own modes of transport by combining different vehicles together.



The focus for learning in Oak this week was bones and skeletons. The children have enjoyed listening to the "Funnybones" stories and singing Dem Bones! They have drawn pictures, added speech bubbles and have written some fabulous questions using question marks. Mr Bones has also visited all the classrooms, as well as Miss Sanger's class trying to put Mr Garlick back together!



Dinosaurs in the wild trip:

A few million years ago, Year 2 travelled to the Chronotex timebase to see and understand more about dinosaurs. 


New Girls' Athletics Shorts




