All however came together as a body of sound that rang out and put Hazelwood School Chapel Choir on the international map. We sang for ourselves. We sang for our friends who were unable to join us for the trip. We sang for the school. We sang for those families who had travelled to Verona to lend their support and encouragement. We sang for the experience of standing alongside adult and junior choirs from countries such as Croatia, Ireland, Sweden, USA and of course, Italy. Never in our dreams did we think we were singing for GOLD!



Outside of the competition, there were many highlights of the trip. For me, these include our impromptu singing in the Arena of Verona, the site, in ancient times gone by, of ferocious gladiatorial battles, the Friendship Concert held in the stunning Church of Marcellise and the day we spent in Venice riding the gondolas and eating ice cream! (Thank you to Mrs Carew-Gibbs for bursting into operatic song as we navigated the narrow Venetian canals). I am sure that the children, and staff who accompanied the trip, each have their own memories. I hope they will be as happy and be remembered as fondly as mine. Thank you to the children for their focus, manners and spirit throughout the trip. It was a pleasure to share the adventure with you all. Thanks too to the staff who all go the extra mile and beyond to ensure that our pupils have the very best and safest of times. And thank you to the parents who supported the trip, from home and in Italy. Knowing that you were all behind us gave us confidence and desire to do our very best. Romeo and Juliet have made Verona the city of love. We LOVED every minute of our time in this most beautiful of places.

Congratulations to Charlotte Dancy, Katie Falconer and Louise Scott who all completed the London Marathon on Sunday. Through the aches and pains on Monday they were delighted with their times and thoroughly enjoyed the experience of Race Day.


News from The Nursery & Early Years

The children have returned to HNEY with a spring in their steps and renewed energy as we head into the Summer term. It is lovely to see so many happy faces on site and even the attempted snow/hail in the middle of the week didn't put a dampener on spirits. The children have come back to a flurry of activity across the site.

Fledglings 1 have been getting stuck in to their new pink playdough. They have created story sacks and looked at different nursery rhymes. The children have enjoyed finding different objects under plant pots of varying size and then they have used some of the smaller plant pots to plant their own parsley and basil seeds. Thus showing that even the youngest of our nursery children have the skills to be green fingered.

Fledglings 2 have also been exploring some new playdough, creating dough bugs and wiggly worms. The children have enjoyed printing with vegetables and making apple print lady birds. They have also had enormous fun creating large scale paintings for their display boards.

Top Robins have been looking at letter shapes and sounds and have been using puzzles to help them do this. The children enjoyed playing with moon sand and creating their own cardboard sandals with threading holes for their laces.



Bottom Robins have been looking at transport this week and have created a role play garage area and enjoyed making trains out of egg cartons to put on their train tracks. They have taken back the bake off crown this week with their traffic light biscuits – going, going – gone!



The children in Skylarks prepare the growing pots for their cress caterpillars. Meanwhile outside, the beans, strawberries and leeks are growing tall and strong.

This week in Skylarks the children have been looking at how plants grow. They have enjoyed the garden centre role play area where they have been using money to pay for plants. They have created their own paper plants in pots that have acted as the produce to sell to the green fingered customers. The children have enjoyed taking care of the plants outside and have ensured that they have remained watered. The focus story for this week has been 'Jack and the Bean Stalk'. The children have enjoyed listening to and responding to the story as well as creating their own beanstalk. The children made individual leaves and have worked hard on counting the leaves and writing numbers in numerical order on them.

This week Oak have enjoyed reading the book "Little Hotchpotch" which is about an animal which is made up of different animals. The children have enjoyed creating their own Hotchpotch animals drawing, painting and working on the computer. They have also worked in pairs, being encouraged to listen to their friend's ideas.


Driving towards his dreams

Our results are already on their way to the University of Leeds for marking and I know our pupils are already excited to know how that fared.


