

News from The Nursery & Early Year

Maths and Technology have been at the forefront of our minds this week at the Nursery and Early Years Site. With numbers, shapes and measuring taking place in all of the rooms and counting rhymes and number songs ringing out wherever I visit, I feel inspired by all that I have seen. Moya Slade has also been at the site getting updated photos of all the rooms, we look forward to seeing these very soon.

Fledglings 1 have enjoyed sorting 'compare' bears into colour groups, even the youngest children were able to get involved in the Maths & Technology Week. They have been looking at numbers up to 5, with some well-known rhymes to help them along the way. In the garden the children have been making shapes and marks in their messy outdoor flour play.

Fledglings 2 have reclaimed the bake off crown this week with their cake stacks. How high can a cake stack stack? The children have also been sorting teddy bears into size order with the Small, Medium and Large sorting bears. They have enjoyed measuring and ordering everyday objects and creating shape pictures.

Top Robins have been looking at 3D shapes and from this have been drawing shapes, looking at number puzzles and building towers. They have also been working on some rather special cards for an important day in the not too distant future.....watch this space Dads.



It's amazing what you find when you closely examine Shredded Wheat using spoons and tweezers. At 10 o'clock it's time for a spot of measuring: first ourselves and then the frogs and tadpoles. All of the children have been measured, from tallest to shortest and the children have been involved in helping with this and recording the information. In addition, the children have enjoyed playing number dominos and matching numbers to quantities. In the garden, the children have used tweezers in the messy play cereal tray to sort different cereal pieces. Hours of fun to be had with this activity using everyday items.

The Skylarks children have been looking at volume, weight and measurements. They have been focusing on their number formation and describing shapes, matching quantity to number and looking at numbers in our environment. In the garden they measured the volume of rainfall during the week. Far too much for June!





Saddle sore but triumphant!

It's done. Having crossed Hungary, Slovakia, Austria, Germany, Holland, Belgium and France, Mr Cooper arrived back in Oxted, UK on Saturday totally exhausted after 12 days of cycling almost 2,000 kms. He says 'never again' but reading his account, the Nutshell is not so sure.....

Day 1 (185k) was a flat ride from Budapest to Dunajska Streda in Slovakia. Day 2 was also flat but provided us with our first real obstacle when it began to rain heavily while our supporting driver Paul was being unsupportive picking Marcus up from Vienna airport. They

arrived at the charming Chinese we had sought shelter in around 1.45. We realised then that after 85k we still had 100k to go – a little demoralising if I'm honest. Day 3 (165k) was a little easier as the road remained flat along the Danube to Linz.

Day 4 (147k and into Germany) provided the first real hill of the trip just as Hannes arrived and Marco left (good timing?). Trudging up the hill, Hannes was hit by the wing mirror of a car driven by an older gentlemen. Hannes suggested in pleasant German that maybe he was unable to see the bike over the large stomach of his wife...we moved on. Alan arrived in the evening.

Days 5 (181k) and 6 (172k) sees us ride from Oberporing to Martheidenfeld in Germany. Day 7 (162k) - We set ourselves up for the first big climb of the trip; a 25k 600m climb. This turned out to be a walk in the park compared to the brutality of the rest of the 35-degree day. A very hot day pushed both of us to the very limit.

I was not good on Day 8 (165k) and relied on following the wheel of Alan as we headed to Cologne. Alan got persuaded by Marcus to remain in the hotel bar for a bit longer that night which led to a later start for Day 9 (160'ish k) as we headed to Belgium.



Day 10 (175k) was the longest of the trip as trying to navigate our way through Antwerp proved to be our undoing. We gave up the ghost on the very outskirts of Bruges and called for help after some 10 hours in the saddle. So much for the "easy to follow cycle paths".

The evening of Day 10 brought in Stewart who arrived like a man possessed and thought nothing of drinking 6 pints of Stella the evening before a long ride to Ashford. Not sure he read Dave Brailsford's marginal gains theory....

Day 11 (140k) was a flat ride to Calais. The cyclists had to navigate themselves and the driver/navigator out of Dunkirk en route (good navigation Simon!) but we reached the Eurotunnel with time to spare. We boarded the train only to be told that an electrical fault would delay departure. Stewart now ruing the fact that we had 'flown' at 28-30k an hour to make sure we were in time for the train. Chris and Andy arrive in the evening for the glory leg.

Day 12 (75k) starts with watching the Lions in a charming pub in Ashford. The great British breakfast murdered in a microwave. The homecoming that we received upon arriving in Oxted was truly humbling – thank you.

A big thank you to the riders; Marco (Days 1,2 and 3), Hannes (Days 4 and most of day 5), Stewart (Days 11 and 12), Chris and Andy (Day 12) and domestique extraordinaire Alan (Days 5 – 12). The drivers/navigators Paul, Marcus, Sean and Simon made the ride a little more bearable by filling water bottles, carrying bags and generally trying to help us traverse our way through Europe. A big thank you to Paul who provided the daily updates that kept most entertained ably supported by Sean and Simon.

And finally, to all of you who donated to this worthy cause. The current total is in excess of £10,000.




News from the Maths Department – Year 5 predict the hung Parliament!



Having constructed a probability scale (or probability washing line) in the classroom, pupils were keen to share their thoughts.....




Some concentrated on important sporting matters. Others thought about the chance of new pets
