## The Nutshelle

Our final Jane Simister disposition this year is Risk Taking and on Monday John Surtees OBE, came to Hazelwood and gave a very informative and humorous talk to the children across the school from Years 1-8 about taking calculated risks based on knowledge and understanding.

Mr Surtees is a four-time 500cc motorcycle World Champion, winning that title in 1956, 1958, 1959 and 1960, and he was the Formula One World Champion in 1964. He remains the only person to have won World Championships on both two and four wheels. Mr Surtees is also a Hazelwood parent as his late son Henry attended Hazelwood and was taught by Mrs Dean and Mrs Addison.


Our children were enthralled with stories of John's early life and career, which included parting company with his motorcycle and whizzing past the winning bike without his machine, and finding unexploded incendiary bombs during WWII when playing behind his home. Mr Surtees also spoke to the children about how he became a racing driver and the characteristics such as perfectionism that he used to become the best in the world in his

chosen field. It was a risk to move from motorcycles to Formula 1 but he rose to the challenge to become World Champion and so is a great example of a calculated risk taker.

There is a fabulous display in the school's Main Reception of all the calculated risks taken by the pupils at Hazelwood over the course of this academic year. Do take time to include it on your Open Day tours, or pop by and study it on another occasion. It is a wonderful example of the collective enterprise which pervades the school. The children are already prepared to take calculated risks - an attitude which is essential in our entrepreneurs of the future.

Priceless. I am sure that within their midst there were some future Usain Bolts - for me the morning is all about enjoyment and togetherness. There is plenty of time later on in life for the more serious side of athletics and competition to shine through.

This is equally true of the Oak to Year 2 Musical Activity Morning, orchestrated for the second time only on Friday, which filled the Chestnut building with sounds of instruments being made and played and music being enjoyed by our youngest pupils. The relative hush which had descended over the site since the departure of Year 8 and Year 4 on their residential trips, was shattered - in a good way - with the sounds of their laughter and impromptu performances.. It was lovely to see the children from the two sites combining so wonderfully and having such a fabulous morning together. I am confident that the event will become an annual highlight in the school calendar and that we are guaranteed many more mornings of merry music making.
